## AUTHOR BIOGRAPHIES

**Soyoung Kwon** is Assistant Professor of Global Affairs at George Mason University Korea and a research associate fellow at Yonsei University's Yonsei Institute for Unification Studies. Her research interests include comparative politics, North Korean studies, inter-Korea relations, peace and security in Northeast Asia, conflict resolution, and sports for development and peace. Dr. Kwon taught and conducted research as an associate fellow at the East Asia Institute of the University of Cambridge and as a Shorenstein fellow at the Walter H. Shorenstein Asia-Pacific Research Center at Stanford University. She served as a Korea specialist and advisor on European Union-Korea relations at the European Parliament in Brussels. She also served as an International Relations advisor to the International Sports Organization. Dr. Kwon taught at the Graduate School of International Studies at Kyung Hee University and the International Studies Department at Chonbuk National University. Dr. Kwon received her B.A. in Political Science and Diplomacy from Ewha Women's University, and her M.Phil. and Ph.D. from the University of Cambridge.

**Gary J. Sampson** is the 2017-18 Commandant of the Marine Corps Fellow at the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, Tufts University. Major Sampson is a doctoral student concentrating in international security studies; his dissertation will focus on China's role in North Korean nuclear decision-making since the rise of Kim Jong-un. He is also an External Fellow at Boston University's International History Institute. An intelligence officer and Northeast Asia Foreign Area Officer, Major Sampson was an Olmsted Foundation Scholar assigned to Kaohsiung, Taiwan. He earned a Master of Social Science degree in China and Asia-Pacific Studies from National Sun Yat-sen University. Major Sampson also holds a Master of Science in Strategic Intelligence from National Intelligence University, Washington, D.C., and an Associate of Arts in Chinese-Mandarin from Defense Language Institute – Foreign Language Center. His writings have appeared in the *Marine Corps Gazette*, *Military Review*, *The Strategy Bridge*, the Central Intelligence Agency's *Studies in Intelligence* journal, and in an edited volume of conference proceedings on nuclear issues from the Center for Strategic and International Studies.

**Gabriel Jonsson** is Associate Professor in Korean Studies at Stockholm University, Department of Asian, Middle East and Turkish Studies. He received his B.A. in East Asian Studies in 1987, and his Ph.D. in Korean Studies in 1996, both from Stockholm University. He graduated from the Korean Language Institute at Yonsei University in 1986. Professor Jonsson's teachings include Korean language, history, politics, economics and inter-Korean relations. His research focuses on inter-Korean relations, South Korean domestic politics and the two Koreas' relations with the UN. His latest publications include, *Towards Korean Reconciliation: Socio-Cultural Exchanges and Cooperation* (Ashgate Publishing, 2006); *Peacekeeping in the Korean Peninsula* (Korea Institute for National Unification, 2009); *Consolidation of Democracy in South Korea?* (Stockholm University, 2014) and *South Korea in the United Nations: Global Governance, Inter-Korean Relations and Peace Building* (World Scientific, 2017). Professor Jonsson is a regular visitor to South Korea.

**Shawn Creamer** is a United States Army Colonel assigned to the Department of the Army staff at the Pentagon. He served in the Republic of Korea from 1996-1999 and from 2011-2016 in troop and staff assignments with the United Nations Command Security Battalion at Panmunjom, the U.S. Army 2<sup>nd</sup> Infantry Division, Eighth United States Army and U.S. Forces Korea. While assigned to U.S. Forces Korea, Colonel Creamer was appointed for duty to the United Nations Command and the Combined Forces Command, where he served as an Alliance and Multinational Policy Adviser. He last commanded a combined U.S.-ROK Weapons of Mass Destruction-Elimination Task Force consisting of a U.S. Combined Arms Battalion, 92 embedded Korean soldiers, a direct support Korean Infantry Company, and a U.S. Chemical Company. Colonel Creamer completed two 12-month deployments to Iraq. Other staff assignments include tours at the National Ground Intelligence Center and as the Stryker Vehicle Manager at the Headquarters, Department of the Army. Colonel Creamer graduated from The Citadel, the Military College of South Carolina, in 1995 and was commissioned as an Infantry Officer. From 2016 to 2017, he was the Army War College Fellow at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology Security Studies Program.

**Noam Hartoch**, Ph.D., is an independent researcher and historian of civil and military aviation in the Middle-East and Asia. He served as a research officer in the Israel Air Force Air Historical Branch and the Intelligence corps. Dr. Hartoch is an associate editor of the Israeli Aviation and Space magazine BIAF, a Member of the International Association of Aviation Historians, London, and life-member of the American Aviation Historical Society. Currently employed as departmental head in the operations directorate of the Israel Airports Authority (IAA), Dr. Hartoch is the academic director of the IAA's senior aviation management course and lectures on aviation topics within the organization. He holds an M.A in Security Studies from Tel Aviv University, and a PhD in Mediterranean and Near-East Studies from King's College, London. Dr. Hartoch authored two books, *Jet Commander Westwind* (Air Britain Historians, Ltd. 1980) and *The Galilee Squadron During the War of Independence* (Rishon Le-Tsion, 1999). He has published many articles on aviation issues in English and Hebrew.

**Alon Levkowitz**, Ph.D., is the Chair of Social Science and Civics department at Beit Berl College, the coordinator of the Asian Studies Program at Bar-Ilan University, and researcher at the Begin Sadat Center for Strategic Studies at Bar-Ilan University. His research focuses on politics and foreign relations in East Asia, the Korean foreign and security policy, and Northeast Asian security. His current projects focus on the: North Korean military cooperation with Middle Eastern states; the economic and diplomatic relations between South Korea and the Middle East relations, South Korea's African policy and the North Korean missile industry. He has published articles in number of academic journals including *International Relations of the Asia Pacific*, *The Korean Journal of Defense Analysis*, *Defense and Peace Economics*, *Middle East and Policy Studies*, *Military & Strategic Affairs*, *BESA Perspectives Papers* and chapters on Korean Peninsula foreign in several edited volumes.

**James Durand** is Editor-in-Chief of the *International Journal of Korean Studies*. A career Marine officer specializing in intelligence and cryptology, he completed five assignments in the Republic of Korea and Japan. Mr. Durand's military education includes graduating from the Republic of Korea Naval War College and Japan's National Institute for Defense Studies. Following the Marine Corps, he worked at Morgan Stanley Japan Securities, where he was responsible for enhanced Due Diligence focusing on identifying parties linked to transnational criminal organizations and entities sanctioned by the Office of Foreign Asset Control. Returning to the United States, he worked for Aspen Medical USA, a global provider of healthcare solutions in remote and austere environments. Mr. Durand currently works for Advanced Concepts and Technologies International, providing acquisition management and Foreign Military Sales solutions for the U.S. Government and allies. His research interests focus on modern Korean military history. Mr. Durand has published papers in English, Korean, and Japanese language professional journals including the *Marine Corps Gazette*, *Leatherneck*, *Vietnam Magazine*, *International Journal of Korean Studies*, *Marine Spirit (Korean)*, *Research Institute for Marine Corps Strategy (Korean)* and the *Japan-Korea Military History Research Forum (Japanese)*.
