AUTHOR BIOGRAPHIES

Kyle Ferrier is the Director of Academic Affairs and Research at the Korea Economic Institute (KEI) of America. He is charged with managing KEI's outreach efforts to foster collaboration between the academic and policy communities. As part of his responsibilities, Mr. Ferrier serves as an editor for KEI's On Korea and Joint U.S.-Korea Academic Studies journals. He writes on a variety of Korean political economic and economic issues for KEI's blog, The Peninsula, and his work has also appeared in outlets such as The Diplomat and East Asia Forum. Prior to joining KEI, Mr. Ferrier worked for the Bank of New York Mellon and was a Program Assistant in the Bureau of Population, Refugees, and Migration at the U.S. State Department. He was also a Fulbright English Teaching Assistant for the 2011-2012 grant year in South Korea. During his time in Korea, he led his students in a U.S. embassy-sponsored youth diplomacy program in Seoul, volunteered with North Korean escapees, and completed a Korean language course at Seogang University. Mr. Ferrier holds an MSc in International Political Economy from the London School of Economics and a B.A. in Economics and Government and International Politics from George Mason University.

Troy Stangarone is the Senior Director of Congressional Affairs and Trade at the Korea Economic Institute of America (KEI). He focuses on issues pertaining to U.S.-Korea relations, South Korea's foreign and economic policy, and North Korea. He also serves as editor for *Korea's Economy* and KEI's blog, *The Peninsula*. He was a 2012-2013 Council on Foreign Relations International Affairs Fellow in South Korea, sponsored by the Asan Institute for Policy Studies. In addition to his work at KEI, Mr. Stangarone is a member of the George Mason University |Korea President's Advisory Board, the International Council of Korean Studies Board, and the Korea-America Student Conference's National Advisory Committee. Prior to joining KEI, Mr. Stangarone worked on Capitol Hill for Senator Robert Torricelli on issues relating to foreign affairs and trade. He holds a MSc. in International Relations from the London School of Economics and Political Science and a B.A. in Political Science and Economics from the University of Memphis.

Michelle Rubido Palumbarit is an assistant professor at the Asian Center, University of the Philippines Diliman. She handles courses on Korea and is in charge of the Korea Studies track at the Center's Asian Studies Program. Dr. Palumbarit's research interests include Korean Studies, Philippine-Korea relations, ASEAN-Korea relations, Filipino migrants in Korea, and global environmental politics. After language studies at Yonsei University's Korean Language Institute, Dr. Palumbarit earned a Master's degree in Korean Studies, and a Ph. D. in Political Science, both from Yonsei University. She has published articles in the International Journal of Climate Change Strategies and Management, Journal of Territorial and Maritime Strategies, and Localities. Dr. Palumbarit has appeared as a commentator on GMA, CNN and CNTV. She also gave lectures on the Philippines and Korean relations at the Armed Forces of the Philippines; Philippines and ASEAN relations at the Ateneo de Manila University; Filipino migrants in Korea in Gwangju organized by Asia Cultural Center; and in Jeju, Korea sponsored by CIFAL Philippines and CIFAL Jeju. Prior to her studies in Korea, she studied at the Asian Center, University of the Philippines Diliman where she earned her Master's degree in Asian Studies specializing in Korea.

George Hutchinson is SecuriFense Inc.'s Senior Regional Planner for managing and resolving encroachment challenges affecting local Korean communities and U.S. Air Force operations in the Republic of Korea. Before joining SecuriFense, Mr. Hutchinson was Senior Director for Power and Energy at Concurrent Technologies Corporation, supporting the development and execution of the Air Force Synthetic Fuels program. He served a career in the Air Force, specializing as a Northeast Asian Foreign Area Officer, Logistics Readiness Officer and Korean linguist. Phillip C. Shon is Professor of Criminology in the Faculty of Social Science and Humanities at the University of Ontario Institute of Technology, where he teaches courses in homicide and criminological theory. His research interests include parricide and other forms of murder. Dr. Shon has published several articles, book chapters, and scholarly book reviews. Dr. Shon earned a B.A. in Philosophy and an M.A. in linguistics from Northeastern Illinois University. He completed an M.A. and Ph. D. in Criminal Justice from the University of Illinois at Chicago.

Justin Malzac earned an M.A. in History from Pittsburg State University, where he focused on East Asian and Korean History.
